


WELCOME

Winner of three Academy Awards, Hud marked a new kind of western. At the onset of the 1960s, the father-son relationship in Larry McMurtry's original story demonstrates how the hardships of cattle ranching are no less difficult than corralling the youthful exuberance of the next generation.

A silent film gem from 1920, The Daughter of Dawn was rediscovered in 2005 in a private collection. It was filmed with an entirely Comanche and Kiowa cast. Rodney Sauer provides live accompaniment on keyboard, using a score by Charles Wakefield Cadman. An expert on Native American music, Cadman lived in Fort Collins and toured with Princess Tsianina Redfeather (namesake of Redfeather Lakes.)

J. J. Harper lost his life during a fateful encounter with Constable Robert Cross in Winnipeg.

Cowboys and Indians depicts the ensuing investigation into mistaken identity and police use of excessive force, including perspectives from Canada's indigenous population. The film was recognized with several Gemini Award nominations, an honor similar to the Emmy Award in the US.

Michael Greyeyes is lauded for his masterful portrayal of Sitting Bull. One of Weldon's actual paintings is still on display in the North Dakota Heritage Center and State Museum.

In 1897 in Northern British Columbia, the outlaw sisters
Billy and Clara gun down the vigilantes who are about
to hang their older sibling, Mary Jo. But Mary Jo faces
another deadly threat. She's ill with "the strange
rabies." Can Billy and Clara save her life without
getting caught? Should they even try? Under Murphy's
Law, doing "good" is relative.

The Legacy (L'Heritage)

Directed by Pierre-Alexandre Chauvat (France, ca. 20 mins.)
After several years in the wild, a trapper accepts a sheriff's job in a small town. He and the town mayor agree to meet in the saloon and close the deal. Unfortunately, the former sheriff shows up too. It turns out he's not happy about losing his job. Not happy at all.

Directed by Kong Thao (USA, ca. 19 mins.)
In a dystopian future, law enforcement has been corrupted, and a society of outlaws has been created. One man intends to run from his past, but when he can't outrun it, he has to decide his future.

Rumor

Directed by Christian Hammons and Eric Coombs Esmail. (USA, ca. 16 mins.) In a small town on the High Plains, a girl learns that her brothers have kidnapped the bully who drove her twin to suicide. What will she do?

The End

Directed by Wiebe Bonnema (The Netherlands, ca. 5 mins.)

In this animated Western, you're invited to follow a cowboy on his path into the empty nothingness of the desert, after he rides out of the town he just saved.

Calamity Jane 1882

Directed by Enrique Novials (Spain, ca. 10 mins.) The famous gunslinger Calamity Jane must face the local sheriff, Rubio, head of the gang of criminals known as "La Manada."

The Reckoning Of Hope Springs

Directed by David Alkire (USA, ca. 14 mins.)
Go West's Local Filmmaker Selection. When a young, stoic
Texas Ranger investigates the disappearance of a sheriff
in Hope Springs, Texas, he discovers that the town is run
by an octopus-worshiping cult that wants him as their
next sacrifice. Filmed in Greeley, Colorado with no actual
harm to sea life.
